Franklin Graphics, Trade Litho Reacquired and Merged

Miami, FL- July 26, 2002 Effective July 26, 2002, a management group, led by Robert Dunne and Jerry Alvarez, and including Peter Dunne and Michael Barber, purchased the stock of Franklin Graphics and Trade Litho from an affiliate of Kelmscott Communications, LLC. The transaction included the assets and businesses of the former Little River Press and Trade NCSUI which had previously merged into Trade Litho. The corporations were immediately merged into a new company to be known as Franklin/Trade Graphics, LLC. Most of the personnel and equipment from the Franklin Graphics have moved to the Trade Litho building in Hialeah, which will be the company's headquarters.

Former owners of the companies, Messrs Robert Dunne and Jerry Alvarez, will serve as co-chairmen of the company. Peter Dunne has been named President and Chief Operating Officer, Michael Barber as Vice President-Manufacturing, Terry (Duffy) Dyer as Sales Manager, and William Horninger as Controller and Treasurer. The newly merged company will continue to work with Kelmscott Communications as a business partner for a number of projects and customer accounts.
